Quixote House grew out of the Next Step Peer Support Program. The name was suggested by one of the residents because Don Quixote was someone who never gave up. The "guys" all liked it!

Fr. Dave liked it because there were no overtly religious connotations, and nothing linked to preconceived ideas.





Sr. Carol and Fr. Dave carried the spirit of compassion and love in many different settings: prisons, community meetings, social services environments, parole and judicial contexts and more specifically, in our Thursday night peer support group gatherings and Quixote and Massie Houses.


