Our Next Step group continues to meet weekly in person, and we have a wonderful time at group. We continue to be thankful for our 6 volunteers (Father John, Scott, Lenny, Joel, Rosalinda and Crystal) who attend weekly to provide care and a listening ear to the men in our group. The volunteers assist with computer training, resume prep, Monday night group in Stony Mountain and visits both in and outside of Stony Mountain.

I was born in Portage La Prairie, but I grew up all over the place. I was a part of Child and Family Services I think from when I was about 2 or 3 years old. We were determined kids and I was always with one of my sisters so every time we would run away and go back to my mom. I did live in a lot of foster homes and most of them were good. There was one time though I do remember being treated badly.

School, I remember enjoying for the most part. I did go to a lot of different schools because of living in so many places. I really liked this one school in St. Vital but we got kicked out of the house we were living at so I couldn't go to that school anymore. So

heard a lot about prison and the awful things that can happen but it's the things people do when they get there that causes the problems. I minded my own business. I stayed away from gangs, and politics and debt. This last time I was in prison my mom has passed away and she was my biggest support, and she had a lot of hope for me. I loved her so much and loved spending time with her. She gave me food. She helped me out and I helped her out. I have no plans to ever return to prison. Meeting the people of Future Hope and Next step and the guys at Quixote House have made a major impact for me. Next Step is such a great support. Helping each other and the activities we do. At first, I was anxious about attending and wondered what I would talk about. But after a while I got used to it. It is good to talk and share and it takes away the anxiety.

I am fortunate to live at Quixote House with a

sometimes we lived with my mom and sometimes not, but we always wanted to be with my mom. I finished grade 6 or 7 I think but then I dropped out. I do remember geography being something I liked. I have recently signed up to take my GED to complete my education and I am proud and excited to do that.

I began getting into trouble around 2015 when I started hanging out with some friends and drinking. Over time the drinking continued, and I got into drugs and it led to me committing a number of armed robberies which led me to prison twice. Drinking, drugs, wanting money and poor decisions led me to prison not once but then twice.

When I first was taken into custody it felt awful. I was sitting in cell and worried about what was to become of me. I had

great group of guys. There is a lot of support here and no one bothers me. I have privacy, the food is good, and my housemates are great. It is quiet and can be peaceful. I am getting to know the guys better, and I enjoy watching sports together.

As for drinking and drugs, now I don't care for it. I don't need it. Sometimes I feel like I could use again but I don't want to go back to Stony Mountain. My mom did not want me to be in jail anymore and I want to honour my mom.

As for my future, I will be returning to school. I hope to get my driver's license and I love to attend pow wows and sun dances. I like spending time in the community. I look forward to what life brings.
