We continue to build community, belonging and relationships in many ways. Our Wednesday night Next Step Peer Support Group is the key to what we do; We meet men while they are incarcerated and get to know them so that when they come into community, they already feel a connection with our staff and volunteers and in many cases the other men in our group. We meet weekly to do personal development, share some coffee and snacks and then talk about how our week is going and how we can positively impact each other to be supported, solve problems and concerns and live a positive social life. We are grateful to our many presenters and speakers who come on Wednesday evening to share their knowledge and their wisdom. Along with Wednesday evenings we have a Next Step Peer Support Group inside Stony Mountain biweekly Mondays. This is to introduce men there to Next Step to see if it is something they will need in the future and for us to begin building relationships. It is tremendous joy and an honor to meet the many men who are seeking help to ensure they do not return to incarceration.

These two groups would not exist without the volunteers and so please assist me in thanking Crystal, Lenny, Joel, Rich, Larry, Sherry, and Rosalinda. As well, there are several men in our group who show up early and stay late each week to set up chairs, coffee, snacks and then cleanup. This extends to people at the houses like Ryan, who help with day to day operations. We couldn't do this without all of you and we are grateful.

We have many parishes that donate money to assist in our weekly meetings and enable us to purchase items for men when they first come back to the community. Items such as clothing, hygiene products, pillows and blankets, towels, bus tickets, foods - all of which are very needed and can feel overwhelming if you don't have. Throughout the year we celebrate many things together for example Christmas, Thanksgiving and Easter, (mostly centering around food)! We also participate in activities of fun and enjoyment together to build community, trust, just pure joy. Activities like canoeing, bowling, going to museums, the symphony, the Goldeyes, Bombers, Moose games, Rumor's Comedy Club, and pool parties and BBQ's. All this builds trust and care in the community with each other.

We currently have room for 18 men to live in the houses in our community of Future Hope: Quixote House on Furby street and the Massie Apartments on Furby street and a home in St. Boniface. All the homes provide comfort, safety, support and community. It is the expectation that if you live in the homes you participate in the community by way of Next Step Peer Support Group, community meals on Friday evenings and group activities. Friday nights is community dinner night at Quixote House, and we welcome all men from the homes, our Next Step group, former men from the community as alumni. They all gather for a meal and to continue the relationships we have been building. A

We wanted to share some of the successes the men have experienced in 2024:

- Several men have hit their warrant expiry and are now off parole
- Almost 90% of the men we work with are employed or in school
- Special thanks to Purpose Construction and Build Inc for providing opportunities
- Sobriety Anniversaries are a huge event, a massive success and worth celebrating
- Several men have moved from Massie apartments into their own living situations
- Several men have moved from Quixote House into their own living situations
- Several have graduated from literacy and education programs
- Securing ID, getting a job, and in some cases a driver's license is a wonderful success

It is important to note that there is not always success, this path and journey to reintegration is hard and challenging and life can throw us curveballs which can set people back for a period of time. We acknowledge how difficult that can be and know that success is still made in small steps. Our community is there for men if they struggle, when they struggle and assist them to continue to take the next step or another first step if needed to move forward.

It continues to be an honor and a gift to support those in Future Hope. At Christmas we are reminded of all the wonderful things there is in this season: friends, family, gatherings, parties, gifts, services but we also acknowledge for many this is not a time of joy. For many it is a time of challenge and hurt and memories that may be unresolved. As we have always done, we are here for the men and will continue to do our best to be the support they require.




Value of Rescued Food

Kinsmen TV Bingo started as "Kingo Bingo" on CJAY-TV in September of 1968 by the Kinsmen Club of Winnipeg. It was broadcast on the first Saturday night of each month with one set prize per broadcast. It proved to be so popular that we moved to a weekly format in 1970 and changed the name to "Kinsmen Jackpot Bingo" with an accumulating Jackpot.

Our Founders





Founded in Longueuil on October 28, 1843, the first congregation of teaching women religious founded by a Canadian woman (Marie-Rose Durocher) expanded quickly. Arriving in Manitoba in 1874, the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary did their utmost to meet the needs in several regions of Manitoba. Today, they still seek to meet the challenges of our time through education in various forms: faith education, academic education and justice education.

The Jesuits are an order of Catholic priests and brothers. For nearly 500 years, we have been on a mission of service, venturing into uncharted territories and laboring where the need is greatest. Founded in 1540 by St. Ignatius of Loyola, the Jesuits have always been more than just priests and brothers; They have been explorers, educators and advocates. From scholars to woodworkers, from saints to a pope, their legacy is rich and varied.
